
As usual, as we gathered in the hospitality room on Sunday evening, we became aware of those who would or would not be attending. The hop to the West coast meant a heavy representation by California.


"usual." It was not long into the first day when the schedule became clear and the scope of the planning effort by Marge and Joe became evident.

#### CONCENTRIC SYMMETRY

M-131	Well made simple design.
M - 132	Small "crank" knob. Also contains fourfold symmetry.
M-133	Has flower bud border, like M-127.
M-134	Chicago/Niles. Also could be eightfold.
M-135	Vernacular. Iron. Circa 1880. Also contains a swirl.
M - 136	Cast. Fourfold center. Made in iron and bronze.



N 162	Doggo motif was nonular for oval knobs






